BOOK PROJECT

The Enlightenment Crisis of Values. Combining literary studies and intellectual history, my current book project traces how a wide range of British and French authors confronted an alleged consequence of Enlightenment thinking: the relativization of all values. The responses eighteenth-century authors offered to the problem of relativism — through genres including novels, plays, essays, philosophical treatises, historical and critical works, satirical prints, and letters — helps to explain how the Enlightenment came to foster both secular values we still cherish and resilient forms of discrimination we are still struggling to overcome. The history of relativism, I argue, sheds light on this fraught double legacy. My central thesis is that in reasserting objective distinctions in the realm of values, Enlightenment thinkers developed the conceptual tools for reasserting old human hierarchies as well (especially between men and women and Europeans and everyone else).
